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**Article 12: Every child has the right to meet with other children and to join groups and organisations, as long as this does not other people from enjoying their rights.**

The Governors expect that all children will wear the school uniform, and will be neat and tidy at all times.

The school uniform is:-

**Boys:**

navy blue school sweatshirt  
white shirt  
school tie  
grey trousers  
grey or black socks  
dark shoes (no trainers)

**Girls:**

navy blue school sweatshirt or cardigan  
white blouse  
school tie  
grey skirt or pinafore  
white/grey or black socks  
dark shoes (no trainers)

**Summer uniform is worn from the start of the summer term to 30<sup>th</sup> September each year:**

**Girls:**

white open-neck short sleeved blouse (no tie) with grey skirt  
pale blue/white checked dress  
navy blue v-neck school sweatshirt or cardigan

**Boys:**

white open-neck short sleeved shirt (no tie)  
grey shorts/trousers  
navy blue school sweatshirt

Girls are allowed to wear trousers if they choose to do so as part of the Winter uniform. Trousers **MUST** be plain charcoal grey and tailored. Bell-bottoms, slits, cargos and low waistbands are **NOT** allowed, as the trousers are part of a school uniform and not a fashion statement. Skirts are to be knee length.

For PE, a school-badged navy T-shirt and navy shorts are needed (both available from school), together with plimsolls. Trainers at Key Stage 2 are acceptable for outside PE. This uniform should be kept in school in a drawstring bag (obtainable from school uniform provider). Older girls may wear a navy netball skirt as an alternative to navy shorts, children may also wear navy tracksuit bottoms in the winter. Older boys will need football boots and tracksuit bottoms. Navy, grey or white socks are to be worn, grey tights may be worn as part of the winter uniform.

Swimming costumes (one piece costume for girls) and towels, should be brought to school when needed, and taken home on the day of use. The Governors do not allow children to attend school in 'Doc Marten' type boots or basketball-style trainers.

Jewellery, other than a wristwatch and stud ear-rings, is not permitted.

Dyed, shaved and 'sculptured' hairstyles are not acceptable; neat and tidy hairstyles are expected with long hair being tied back.
